Happy Birthday America! – Fun Facts about Independence Day

- 1. **Independence Day isn't technically July 4th.** The Declaration was dated July 4th, but Congress actually voted for independence on July 2, 1776 but was not signed by everyone until August 2, 1776.
- 2. **John Adams knew the significance of Independence Day.** The founding father wrote about it in a letter to his wife. He said the day should be celebrated with parades and fireworks.
- 3. **The Pennsylvania Evening Post printed the Declaration.** They were the first newspaper to do so in the July 6, 1776 issue.
- 4. The population of the U.S. was 2.5 million in July 1776. As of 2020, 330 million people live in the U.S.
- 5. **3 presidents died on July 4th.** All of them signed the Declaration of Independence. John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died about five hours apart on July 4, 1826, which also happened to be the 50th anniversary of the country's independence. James Monroe died on July 4, 1831.
- 6. **The first fireworks celebration went off in 1777 in Philadelphia.** The show included fireworks, cannons, bells, and a parade honoring the 13 original states.
- 7. **The Liberty Bell.** The Philadelphia landmark honor of the 13 original colonies.

- 8. July 4th wasn't always a federal holiday. It took nearly 100 years, becoming a federal holiday in 1870.
- 9. **Americans spend tons on fireworks.** In 2021 nearly \$1.5 billion was spent according to the National Retail Federation. The biggest celebration is Macy's 4th of July fireworks show.
- 10. A lot of food is consumed on the 4th. 155 million hot dogs are eaten according to the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council; \$107 million is spent on popsicles according to the National Retail Federation, and an estimated \$167 million is spent on watermelon. And beer sales are stronger than on Labor Day, Memorial Day and Christmas.
- 11. **There is a "4th of July City".** Back in 1979 an act of Congress named Seward, Nebraska "America's Official Fourth of July City—Small Town USA." Although it has only 7,000 residents, more than 40,000 attend the town's celebration.
- 12. **Bristol, Rhode Island has a huge celebration.** Bristol starts celebrating all things America on Flag Day, June 14th, and the festivities end with a 4th of July parade. Bristol boasts the oldest continuous celebration in the country, dating back to 1785.
- 13. **Residents stay up late in Tennessee.** In the Smoky Mountains, Gatlinberg hosts the Midnight Parade, which kicks off at exactly midnight, launching its Fourth festivities.
